Director's Message

BFSB and Reconnaissance Community,

The TCM ABCT/Recon Team continues to work hard to improve the combat capabilities of our Army's Armored Brigade Combat Teams and Battlefield Surveillance Brigades.

At the recently concluded Maneuver Center Warfighting Conference, TCM Recon participated in several panel discussions. These included addressing the Army National Guard on the future of the BFSB as well as with 1/7 Cavalry, First Cavalry Division as they participated in the panel on the future Scout Platoon and discussed their upcoming NTC Rotation where they will be validating the 6x36 Common Scout Platoon concept.

I can now report that the Army Chief of Staff has approved the R&S BCT Plan. TCM-Recon in conjunction with the Capabilities Development Division here at the MCoE will be working to develop an execution plan to support this future transition. TCM-Recon will keep the BFSB and Reconnaissance Community informed as we continue this process.

TCM-Recon continues to execute the Reconnaissance CBA. The current government shutdown has forced the team to reschedule two working groups with the Aviation and Intelligence Centers of Excellence. The team does not think these delays will, in the long run, adversely affect the completion of the CBA. More information will follow and the team will work hard to keep the community informed on what comes out of the CBA at the completion of each step.

Look for articles in upcoming issues of both the Cavalry and Armor Journal and the Infantry Magazine for more information on the Reconnaissance CBA, the Long Range Reconnaissance and Surveillance Company and the Close Access Target Reconnaissance (CATR) System. Several FOSCOM Units have expressed concerns about the future of CATR. This article and future updates in other forums will go a long way to inform the reconnaissance and intelligence communities on the system and generate feedback on CATR as the Army moves through the funding and Program of Record process.

Finally, I want to recognize the 504th BFSB's MI Battalions currently deployed in Afghanistan and the MI Teams from the 525th BFSB that are currently conducting a battle handover with those 504th units. We wish them success and pray for their safe return.

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560th BFSB gets new home in Cumming, GA

CUMMING REGIONAL READINESS CENTER, Cumming, Ga. Sept. 14, 2013 – Hundreds of members of Forsyth County welcomed the more than 300 Georgia Guardsmen of the 560th Battlefield Surveillance Brigade (BFSB) to the community at a ceremony marking the dedication of the Cumming Regional Readiness Center. More than five years in the making, the CRRC represents a cooperative effort between the Georgia Guard and the people of Georgia.

"Your commitment to your service to our country is admirable," said Cumming Mayor H. Ford Gravitt during his opening ceremony address. "This is a great facility. The City of Cumming in conjunction with the State and Federal Government is very grateful that you are here."

LTC(P) Ray Bossert, commander of the 560th BFSB, complimented the Mayor's message of cooperation.

"I look forward to becoming a valuable asset and friend to this region," said LTC Bossert. "This is YOUR armory. Come have fellowship with us. Come see us during drill weekend."

The readiness center was a flurry of activity starting well before sunrise as Soldiers and vendors set up displays in the chill morning air. Soldiers of the 3-108th Cavalry demonstrated sniper equipment and vehicle weapons systems. The 230th Brigade Support Company set up a mobile kitchen and distributed MREs and conversed with Cumming residents. Soldiers of HHC 560th BFSB demonstrated satellite equipment capabilities. A particularly popular attraction was the "night vision challenge," where young and old alike were able to use night vision goggles to negotiate obstacles in a dark room. Representatives from local law enforcement, fire departments and the American Legion brought displays and equipment and added to the sense of community present at the CRRC.

Several dedication ceremonies were held throughout the day. LTC(P) Bossert joined Mayor Gravitt and the Cumming City Council in dedicating the drill hall in the name of COL William Cumming, a life-long Georgia resident and veteran of the War of 1812. The readiness center auditorium was dedicated to the memory of BG Terrell Reddick, former deputy commander of the Georgia Army National Guard. The 560th BFSB's Command Sergeant Major, Roy Marchert, presided over roll call of fallen warriors and dedicated a tree to fallen warriors.

During the ribbon cutting ceremony, representatives of the Georgia Guard leadership and community leaders noted the significance of the day.



"What an incredible day," said Georgia's Adjutant General MG Jim Butterworth. "The 560th has an incredible history of service around the world. It is going to continue from right here. You have literally the best Guard community coming here building a house in Cumming."

State Senator Jack Murphy noted the economic benefit of having such a large Guard presence in North Georgia.

"When I look around and see what this will do for the community I am truly impressed," said Senator Murphy. "It is going to bring in thousands of dollars to the community. The State committed six million dollars and that contribution survived two presidents and two governors. That is amazing."

Senator Murphy, MG Butterworth and Mayor Gravitt all noted that the new 106,000 square foot facility is projected to return more than \$500,000 in revenue to the city and county annually.

319th MI BN (Task Force Cyclone) awards ceremony

BAGRAM AIRFIELD, Afghanistan- 319th MI BN-Task Force Cyclone has been the Regional Command-East General Support-Reinforcing MI Battalion in support of OEF XIII- XIV for the past 7 months, headquartered at Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan with subordinate Companies deployed to the Parwan, Kapisa, Nangahar, Kunar, Laghman, Ghazni, Wardak, Logar, Paktika, Paktiya, and Khost Provinces. Task Force Cyclone conducts Counterintelligence operations, Signals Intelligence (SIGINT) Collection, AIR HAMMER Operations, SIGINT Terminal Guidance Operations, and Exploitation Operations in support to the Combined Joint Task Force-101 (CJTF-101). Task Force Cyclone's four organic tactical military intelligence Companies are spread across 44,000 square miles, consist of 4 Multifunctional Teams, 13 Counterintelligence Operational Management Team, 2 Kandak Advisory Teams, and 1 Unmanned Ground Sensor Team. The Teams are intended to provide collection and intelligence support to assist Afghanistan and enable the Government of Afghanistan to transition to a self-reliant government through the transfer of security responsibilities, defeating terrorists and irreconcilable insurgents, reducing sectarian violence, and neutralizing extremist groups.

TF Cyclone's impressive contributions are clearly evident in the collection and production of intelligence that provided critical targeting, exploitation, and force protection to RC-E elements. The TF's efforts significantly developed the intelligence capabilities of the Afghan National Army to ensure long-term stability of the nation which resulted in 1,278 completed operations, 34 key leader engagements, 5,042 biometric enrollments, 29 close access target reconnaissance missions, 69 AIR HAMMER missions, and 17 Black Fin II operations. TF Cyclone's collective efforts from the Multi-Function Teams, Counterintelligence Teams, Low-Level Voice Intercept Teams and Prophet Analysis Cells produced more than 1,000 intelligence reports to the International Security Assistance Force (ISAF), its subordinate Brigades, Combined Joint Special Operations Task Force-Afghanistan (CJSOTF-A), and Special Operations Joint Task Force-Afghanistan (SOJTF-A).

Combined Joint Task Force-101 welcomed the 38th Army Chief of Staff General Raymond T. Odierno in the presentation of the CJTF -101 Awards Ceremony. Among the Soldiers that were recognized for their extraordinary heroism and hard work were Soldiers of the 319TH MI BN TF Cyclone. *(continued on page 4)*

'Blue Watch' families bid farewell to deploying Soldiers

FORT HOOD, Texas – Family and friends bid farewell to nearly 125 Soldiers assigned to 163rd Military Intelligence Battalion, 504th Battlefield Surveillance Brigade, during a ceremony at West Fort Hood Gym Thursday morning, Sept. 19, marking the start of a scheduled nine-month deployment to Afghanistan.

"Our task will be at times dangerous. We will be asked to frequently and constantly adjust to an ever-changing operational environment as we prepare to conclude the 12-year-old mission in Afghanistan," remarked LTC Mark Johnson, commander, 163rd Military Intelligence Battalion. "I will say it again: there is no better trained and ready military intelligence battalion in the Army today to deploy and conduct operations in support of Regional Command East."

The 163rd trained just over a year for this particular mission, honing skills from the individual and small team levels, up to company-sized elements, in order to minimize the danger the commander mentions.

"The soldiers are excited and eager to get started. They have trained for the last 13 months and the time has come," LTC Johnson said of his troops.

Soldiers like SGT Kayla Orona-Cortes display that eagerness, albeit peppered with a bit of nerves.

Army's only enlisted Sikh soldier earns rare promotion at JBLM

CPL Simranpreet Lamba stands out when he lines up with his fellow soldiers in his Joint Base Lewis-McChord cavalry troop. He's the bearded one wearing the camouflage turban.

As the Army's only enlisted Sikh soldier, CPL Lamba, 29, feels the pressure to prove himself so others of his faith can put on a uniform and serve their country. He took a step toward that goal Friday when the Army promoted him to corporal, making him the first Sikh to earn that rank in more than 30 years.

"I kind of think all my hard work has paid off," said CPL Lamba, whose enlistment in 2009 triggered a 10-month review in which Army officials considered whether he could serve while sporting the articles of his faith — a turban, uncut hair and a beard.

He's one of a handful of Sikhs serving in the Army across the active-duty and Reserve forces, according to the New York-based Sikh Coalition. Two of the others are in the medical field as officers, one a dentist and one a doctor.

Each current Sikh soldier had to gain an exemption allowing him to serve despite Army policies dating back to 1984 that require soldiers to shave, keep short hair and wear standard berets. Those rules prevented Sikhs from enlisting for decades.

They hail from a 500-year-old religion with roots in India's Punjab Region. About 200,000 to 500,000 Sikhs live in the U.S., according to estimates from the Pew Research Center.

CPL Lamba hopes his promotion will show "there's nothing about being Sikh, about our turban and our beard that can stop us from excelling in the Army," he said.

He enlisted through a military program that recruits foreigners with special skills and offers them a path to citizenship. CPL Lamba, who has become a naturalized U.S. citizen, speaks Urdu, Hindi and Punjabi — languages vital to communication with the people of India and Pakistan.

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60 Fort Bragg Surveillance Soldiers Return From Afghanistan

September 23, 2013- A small group of Fort Bragg Soldiers returned home from Afghanistan Monday as the military works to transfer its operations to Afghan forces.

Sixty soldiers from the 525th Battlefield Surveillance Brigade are arriving at Fort Bragg. The group has been working with Afghan soldiers and civilians to set up communications and intelligence systems.

"Our unit has been assisting with rebuilding the infrastructure and working with the sister units to improve security within the country," said Sergeant First Class ShaVon Hammons, a member of the 525th who returned home earlier this year.

A Fort Bragg spokeswoman says there about 13,500 of the base's soldiers left in Afghanistan. President Obama has ordered combat troops to withdraw from the country by the end of 2014.

297th BFSB unit visit

A team from the TRADOC Capability Manager for Reconnaissance met with the command and staff of the 297th Battlefield Surveillance Brigade from September 27-29, 2013, to capture the unit's multi-year resource and training plans, and collect observations, insights, data and lessons learned for the purpose of analysis across the doctrine, organization, training, materiel, leadership & education, personnel and facilities (DOTMLPF) aspects of the BFSB formation.

The team conducted an in-brief with the 297th BFSB Commander, LTC (P) Chad Parker and provided the commander with the latest status of the Reconnaissance & Security Brigade Combat Team (R&SBCT), including the CSA decision approving the concept and tasking the Maneuver Center of Excellence (MCoE) with developing an execution plan, and the designation of an Armored BCT (ABCT) at Fort Hood and two Stryker BCTs (Alaska and Germany) as the first proof of principle units. The team reiterated a decision has not been made regarding the status of the Army National Guard (ARNG) BFSBs.

The 297th BFSB S3, MAJ Eric Barlow, provided the team a unit capability briefing and a review of their Training Year (TY) 14 Key Events Timeline.

The 297th BFSB conducted an eXportable Combat Training Capability (XCTC) rotation, 4-25 June 2013, at the Orchard Training Area, ID. MAJ Barlow described the XCTC as an "awesome first collective training event for the Brigade."

303rd Military Intelligence Battalion cases colors for Afghanistan

WEST FORT HOOD — Exactly 14 months after uncasing its colors from a deployment to Afghanistan, the 303rd Military Intelligence Battalion furled them Friday to deploy again.

Just as before, the "Longhorn" Battalion, part of the 504th Battlefield Surveillance Brigade, cased its colors on Ready Field to deploy nearly 300 soldiers to Regional Command-East to conduct counterinsurgency and stabilization operations.
