Voice of Arghandab Radio: Thoughts on the Future of a RIAB

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(NIU) The Radio in a Box (RIAB) has been an invaluable tool for ISAF to disseminate its themes and messages to the Afghan population. Radio reaches the widest audience of any media type and is second only to face-to-face in efficacy. As ISAF continues to transition capabilities to GIRoA, there has been an ongoing discussion by ISAF on the final disposition with RIABs post-2014.

(NIU) The Voice of Arghandab (VOA) radio is a RIAB that operates on FM 101.5 out of the Arghandab District Center. USAID initially funded the salaries of the four Afghan employees while the US Army provided the equipment. In October 2011, the AID funding ended and the military stepped in and funded a contract to pay for the Afghan staff. The staff consists of a manager, an editor, and two journalists. VOA is the only radio station operating in the Arghandab district. Other radio stations from Kandahar can be heard in the Arghandab area, but the VOA signal is much clearer. According to the staff, the local people prefer VOA as the programming is more locally focused.

(NIU) Programming consists of a mixture of news, entertainment, Islamic shows, and live call-in shows. Islamic shows also include the ANA Religious and Cultural Affairs Mullah who conducts a call-in show once a week. The station conducts three live, call-in shows a day with a total of twenty-five a week. Callers typically call with requests for songs. There have been threats called in, but these are generally rare (two to three over the past year). The Radio Literacy program is also popular and the DJs get numerous phone-in requests for the books that support the program. The journalists conduct interviews with the District Governor, the Deputy Chief of Police, the Saranwal (prosecutor), and other GIRoA officials, and air them periodically. The Saranwal is apparently quite extroverted and requires significant editing while the District Chief of Police (DCoP) is an introvert and generally dislikes conducting radio interviews. The journalists from the station go out and cover the District Governor outreach efforts. Local listeners are fully aware that VOA is funded by ISAF.

(NIU) Given the robustness of the operation and their market share in the Arghandab area, it would make sense that VOA be a target for transition. The question is a transition to what? All the radio stations in Kandahar are funded or heavily subsidized by governmental entities (GIRoA, US, EC, etc.), non-governmental organizations, or private businessmen. Although some stations do sell advertising, it is not a primary source of revenue. For example, the most popular radio station in Kandahar, with 21 percent market share, Wranga, is funded by a businessman Haji Pashah Kakar who runs a soap factory. Monthly costs to run the station are estimated to be \$2,000 USD of which approximately \$800 USD a month comes from advertising. Killid Radio (11 percent share), which is part of The Killid Group (TKG), is a public media initiative run by the Afghan NGO Development and Humanitarian Services for Afghanistan (DHSA). The TKG's mission as a public media project of DHSA is to promote civic media, free speech, and open discourse in Afghanistan and to strengthen the press as an independent source of information for the Afghan people." They have other radio stations in Kabul, Mazar-e-Sharif, Herat, Nangarhar and Khost. Kandahar Radio & Television Afghanistan (RTA) has a 15 percent market share and has the largest reach of any radio station in Kandahar, about a

radius of 100km. It is fully supported by the Ministry of Information and Culture, but supplements itself with advertising revenue.

(NIU) These are three examples that could be used as models for courses of action for the VOA RIAB, and perhaps other RIABs as well. A new commercial radio station would require a licensing fee of up to \$3,000 USD as well as another \$3,000 USD in annual taxes to the Afghanistan Investment Support Agency. This represents a significant barrier to entry and sustainability for more rural outlets. In conclusion, the VOA station is a robust, mature capability that should be examined more closely as a case study for transition, as ISAF quickly approaches post-2014
