Armor School

316th CAVALRY BRIGADE: GAINEY CUP. Ten active-duty divisions, as well as three National Guard teams and a team from the Marine Corps, made up the 19 teams that competed for the Gainey Cup this year. All teams showed they were in excellent physical condition as they competed non-stop for nearly three days. The "Best Scout Team in the Military" was the team from 1st Squadron, 40th Cavalry Regiment, from the 4th Brigade, 25th Infantry Division, Fort Richardson, AK. We have learned some valuable lessons during this competition. It is clear our scouts are physically strong and are prepared to use direct and indirect fire to engage the enemy when required. It is also clear that scouts need to return to the basics and train vehicle identification, day and night land navigation, observation-post establishment and prepare for CBRNE attacks. 194th ARMOR BRIGADE: FEMALE INTEGRATION. E Company "Easy Riders," 3-81 Armor Battalion, 194th Armor Brigade, is the only training company in the U.S. Army responsible for training 91A (Abrams System Maintainer) and 91M (Bradley System Maintainer) AIT Soldiers. The 91A/M AIT course trains Soldiers to read schematics and technical manuals, basic electronics, remove/install components and troubleshoot vehicles. Their training culminates with a five-day exercise which tests the Soldier's performance on maintenance tasks and recovery operations in a simulated but realistic combat environment. On 6 Mar 13, the first six female Soldiers began training as 91Ms, a previously "male only" MOS. Also, the first female instructor ever for the 91M Bradley Systems Maintainer Course seamlessly integrated into the organization, setting an outstanding example for all 91 series Soldiers. This is one of the first in a series of changes to Army policy regarding women since 1994 when DoD banned females from serving in "close-combat positions." Women have been serving with distinction in other Ordnance positions, essentially performing the same tasks as 91A/M Soldiers, only on different vehicle systems. To this end, the Easy Riders will continue to enforce the standards and provide the force with technically and tactically competent maintainers!

Armor Branch and OCOA Personnel Notes

AOCS 19B AND 19C TO BE REDUCED TO AOC 19. The ongoing initiative to eliminate AOCs 19B and 19C to 19A after necessary memorandums is approved by the DA Office. Once approved, it will go into effect by 31 Oct 2015. No change in training strategy will result because Human Resources Command (HRC) no longer uses either AOC 19B or 19C in the assignments selection process for Armor Branch officers. As stated by OPMD Armor Branch, AOCs 19B and 19C are legacy codes from division-level cavalry units, which are now obsolete. Armor lieutenants who have follow-on assignments at cavalry squadrons will continue to be given priority for attendance at the Army Reconnaissance Course (ARC) immediately following Armor Basic Officer Leader Course (ABOLC).

From the Chief of Armor's Turret

March came in like a lion as 19 scout teams competed in the inaugural Gainey Cup Best Scout Team Competition at Fort Benning, GA.

When the dust settled after four days of competition, the top three teams were 1-40th Cav from 4th Brigade (Airborne), 25th Infantry Division; 4-73rd Cav from 4th Brigade, 82nd ABN; and 3-1 Cav from 3rd Brigade, 3rd ID ... congratulations again!

The Gainey Cup challenged the teams' knowledge and application of cavalry scout

skills, their physical endurance and their weapons proficiency. Because the teams came from across the Army, the Army National Guard and the USMC, the competition provided an opportunity to review our scouts' proficiency. Based on the trends, we will revisit our instruction and will provide recommendations to help inform unit training for decisive action.

Releases of the LTC, COL Command and CSM Centralized Selection Lists occurred this month, and Armor selection rates were tremendous. At the brigade-command level, Armor Branch did very well and achieved proportional numbers for our population as we had a total of 16 principals selected – a significant upward trend from the four officers selected in FY13. This was also the case at the battalion-command level, where we had 33 officers selected as a principal, an increase from 31 selected in FY13.

While specific command slating has not been published yet, our selection numbers suggest that we will be more represented in BCT and BN commands for FY14 than FY13.

For CSM selections, Armor had 10 principals selected at the brigade level and 38 at the battalion level, while the nominative board

RESIDENT ILE SLATING. Human Resources Command (HRC) is developing the resident Intermediate Level Education (ILE) slate for Calendar Year 2014 because of the FY13 majors' promotion and ILE selection boards. See the following for information and clarification about requests for deferral, changes of venue, activations and publication timelines.

Officers requesting a deferral must submit a DA 4187 through the first general officer in their chain of command to HRC NLT 15 Apr 13 for determination by the VCSA. Contact your assignment officer to discuss the potential ramifications of this action. Some units may attempt a "mass" deferral. However, deferrals will only be considered on an individual basis. "Mass" deferrals will be packaged with the individual deferral requests and forwarded to the VCSA for final determination. Officers requesting a change of venue (resident to distance learning (DL) or satellite to DL) must submit a DA 4187 through the first general officer in their chain of command to HRC NLT 15 Apr 13 for determination by the VCSA. Officers selected for resident ILE who are currently in an AOC-producing program (OCLL, JCS, AFPAK Hands, etc.) must contact HRC for venue determination. Officers slated to attend a resident course in AY14 and are competing for an AOC-producing Fellowship program that also begins in AY14 should contact their assignment officer. Slating will occur after final determination by VCSA of deferrals and changes of venue. Slating is based upon availability of the officer. Unit requirements are considered to the greatest extent possible; however, the VCSA is the approval authority for all deferrals and changes of venue. All officers selected for resident attendance not receiving a deferral or change of venue from the VCSA will be slated for attendance in AY14.

Activations will occur during slating to fill all available resident and satellite seats in AY14. Officer Branch has **NO** control, influence or input into the activation of an officer for any ILE venue. Leader Development Division (LDD), HRC, executes and manages the activations in accordance with the OML established by the ILE selection board. LDD will validate activations, and assignment officers will notify activated officers of their change in status.

Tentative publication of the final resident slate is 1 Sep 13, but this remains subject to change.
