

# What Makes a "Good" Case?



- Forensic matches to IEDs (e.g. fingerprints / DNA)
- Weapons and IED caches, IF we can attribute the illegal products to the Detainee
  - Absent specific proof otherwise, the weapons are presumed to belong to the owner of the compound / vehicle
- Sworn (thumb print) admissions from the Detainee
  - Unsworn statements in TIRs are admissible but of low probative value
- Sworn (thumb print) statements from co-detainees
- Sworn (thumb print) statements from Afghans
- NDS Reports





# Improving Use of Evidence

**RoLFF-A and JCIP-I** 



### Issue



- Only about 16% of detainees are recommended for transfer to Afghan prosecution from Detainee Review Boards - principally due to the lack of prosecutable evidence collected by Capturing Units
- Often there is prosecutable evidence, but it is missing amplifying information that could either ensure a conviction or increase the sentence
- DRB statistics show that evidence collection at the point of capture needs improvement
- A concerted and coordinated effort is required to affect change



# Areas for Improvement



- Documentation of disposition of physical evidence (e.g., was it collected or destroyed?)
- More information contained in statements by Afghan partner units
- More plain English and less military jargon in statements
- Use photographs more to document how the detainee looked at the point of capture (especially if wearing a disguise)
- Use field explosive residue testing (ERT) more
- Photograph the results of the ERT with the detainee
- Use tactical questioning to eliminate innocent explanations of explosive residue (e.g., have you eaten preserved meat recently?, what type of fertilizer do you use (if farming)?)
- Use field gunshot residue testing, if the suspect was firing a weapon





# Ways to Get to Improved Evidence Collection



- Increased outreach to BSOs
- Tactical Site Exploitation Course at Sabalu-Harrison
- Mobile training teams from LOD and LEPs
- Distribute pocket-sized evidence guide to ATO
- Train troops before leaving the U.S.



## **End State**



Improved collection of evidence to support criminal cases against detainees and terrorist networks throughout the battlespace IOT off-ramp captures to the Afghan criminal process and transition the maximum number of detainees to GIRoA control.

### Request CJIATF 435 Support to:

- Expand and formalize BSO Outreach initiatives: Mobile Training Teams, Director's Memos, and VTCs
- Support FRAGO directing LEPs and Soldiers to attend LOD training on evidence collection and Afghan criminal procedures, or giving specific guidance in the FRAGO on evidence collection improvement
- Dissemination of updated Theater-wide Evidence
   Collection Guide
- Provide training to units preparing for deployment



# Evidence Collection Checklists



# WEAPONS CACHES INSIDE RESIDENCES

If the weapons are hidden, photograph them in place before
removing them, or if in boxes/containers, make sure the lid is oper
so the picture shows what is in the container or box.
Photograph the room and/or area where the weapons or
contraband were found.
Photograph each suspect and the weapons together.
If more than one suspect, also take a picture of all the
suspects together with the cache.
Take close-ups of the weapons, grenades, detonation cords,
antitank rockets (RPG rockets), ammunition, etc.
Take a photo of the exterior of the suspect's house (courtyard
wall, entrance and exit points, and any major landmarks).
On the appropriate forms (evidence/property, witness
statement, and apprehension), list all weapons and contraband
found at the site.
Take at least two witness statements.
Draw a sketch of the house and specifically the room where
the contraband is located.
Collect and tag evidence.



# KINETIC EVENT/FIRE FIGHT



Weapons recovered after an attack on CF and /or AF.

Gunshot residue test - Photograph detainee to show results of
test.
Close-up photos of weapons, grenades, detonation cords, RPG
rockets, ammunition, where they are found.
Photos of EKIAs.
Sketch of the area of the kinetic event, specifically noting
where the enemy was firing from, the location of any EKIA and
weapons and the location of the detainee in relation to those
things.
At least two witness statements - statements should
<b>CLEARLY</b> indicate if detainee was observed firing, if he was
captured in a place with others who had been firing, if he was
captured w/ weapons or in a room w/ weapons.

# WEAPONS CACHES OUTSIDE RESIDENCES

OR AFORMAT.
If weapons are hidden, photograph them in place before removing
them, or if in boxes/containers, make sure the lid is open so the picture
shows what is inside the container.
Take a photo of each suspect and the weapons found.
If more than one suspect, take a picture of all the suspects together
with the cache.
Take close-ups of the weapons, grenades, detonation cords, RPG
rockets, ammunition, etc.
Take a photo of the suspect's house and where the weapons cache
was located in relation to the house (Note: This photo is used to establish
distance from the home and that the suspect owns the property. The
suspect's house should be in the background).
If the cache is located in the suspect's courtyard, take a picture of the
courtyard wall (Note: This photo is used to show that the property is not
easily accessible).
Take a picture of the courtyard (Note: This photo is used to show the
layout of the property).
On the appropriate forms, (evidence/property, witness statement and
apprehension) list all weapons and contraband found at the site.
Take at least two witness statements.
Draw a sketch of the house and specifically the room where the
contraband is located.
Collect and tag evidence

## **VEHICLE BORNE IED**

Take several photographs showing the damage once scene is cleared by
EOD/CIED.
Take a photograph showing damage to the road.
Take a photograph of the vehicle remnants, including license plate, registration,
and VIN, if possible.
Take several photographs of the aiming points, if any were used by the suspects.
Take photographs of the aiming point showing the damaged vehicle in the
background.
Take photographs of where the suspects were captured in relation to the aiming
point (Note: this photo is used to show distance).
Take a photograph of where the suspects were first observed by USFOR-A or ISA
after the detonation (Note: this is used to show distance and viewpoint of the IED
placement).
Take a photograph of the detonation device, if recovered.
Take a photograph of the detonation device and the suspect if the device is
recovered.
Conduct explosives testing on all suspects and the vehicle and record the
findings. Put findings on all sworn documents.
Take photographs of the explosive testing conducted on the suspects.
Ensure number of photographs were taken and who took them is documented.
Draw a sketch.
Take at least two witness statements.
Collect and tag evidence.



### **UNEXPLODED VBIED or IED**



Only take pictures if safe to do so. As a minimum, EOD/IEDD should be consulted prior to any attempt to collect evidence from any IED scene.

Take several photographs showing the IED.	
Take a photo showing the IED and where it is located in relation to the road.	
Take several photographs of the aiming points used by the suspects.	
Take photographs of the aiming point showing the IED site in the background	
(Note: this photo is used to show distance).	
Take a photograph of where the suspects were captured in relation to the aimi	ng
point (Note: this photo is used to show distance).	
Take a photograph of where the suspect was capture in relation to the IED site	<del>,</del>

Draw a sketch of the scene.	
Take at least two sworn statements.

# **EXPLODED IED**

Photograph the location of the attacks and/or assaults (Note:
these photographs should also include any damage to vehicles or
property)
Photograph all weapons and contraband, to include close-up
photos of the model and serial numbers, if applicable.
Photograph all suspects with weapons and contraband seized.
Photograph shell casings.
Include medical records and or letters from the hospital on all
injuries sustained.
If there are personnel KIA, a copy of the death certificate
needs to be filed for each person killed.
Prepare two sworn statements.
Draw a sketch.
Collect and tag all evidence.
