### Director's Message

BFSB Community,

Last month, I mentioned the Chief of Staff of the Army (CSA) would receive an update by US Army Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC) on courses of action for improving reconnaissance and security capabilities. That session occurred on 27 November with no force design decisions made by the CSA. Instead, TRADOC will continue with analysis that should include two how to fight seminars to examine corps and division recon and security requirements in February and a follow-up session in March to determine doctrine, organization, training, materiel, leader, personnel and facility implications. While not specified, I expect both sessions will include both AC and RC Warfighter representatives similar to the past two events recently conducted by TRADOC.

Changing topics, it's not too early to start looking for information on the 2013 Reconnaissance Summit to be conducted from 5-7 March 2013 at the Maneuver Center of Excellence in Fort Benning, Georgia. The inaugural Gainey Cup, a dismounted Scout competition, will be held 3-5 Mar 2013 in conjunction with the summit in an effort to determine the Army's "best scout". The Armor School is seeking nominees for the 17th Annual Frederick M. Franks Award. The Franks Award is presented to a mounted active-duty or reserve officer, noncommissioned officer or DA civilian who has demonstrated a long-time contribution to the Army's ground-fighting and warfighting capabilities. The winner will receive the award during the 2013 Army Reconnaissance Summit. More information about nominations can be found in the "Thunderbolt Blast" newsletter (go to link on page 4).

In this newsletter, you'll also find articles on the 71st BFSB (TXARNG) Best Warrior Competition, along with a 504th BFSB awards ceremony on Fort Hood, where two of its Soldiers were awarded Silver Stars as a result of their actions during an ambush while deployed to Afghanistan.

### Riggers host familiarization event for partnership nations

KAISERSLAUTERN, Germany – U.S. Army Africa and 21st Theater Sustainment Command's 5th Quartermaster Detachment jointly conducted an aerial delivery familiarization event Nov. 5-8 on Rhine Ordnance Barracks with U.S., African and Italian soldiers.

The purpose of the familiarization was to refine and rehearse aerial delivery tactics, techniques and procedures to be applied during two major upcoming exercises - Central Accord 13 and Flintlock 13.

African partnership nations participating in the event were Cameroon and Mauritania. There were representatives from the Italian Army as well as U.S. Soldiers from 824th Quartermasters, 10th Special Forces Group, 560th Battlefield Surveillance Brigade and 11th Aviation Brigade.

"I think this familiarization is a great opportunity, because it allows us to associate soldiers from partnership nations with low-cost, low-altitude delivery system (LCLA) prior to the exercise, which makes things easier. It's also good to meet with some of the soldiers we will be working side-by-side with during the exercise and build a relationship with them," said Chief Warrant Officer 2 Orlando Velez, an airdrop assistant technician for 5th QM aerial delivery section and native of Westchester, N.Y.

"This familiarization is important, because instead of 5th QM showing up in Africa during the exercise and taking two weeks to familiarize 50 soldiers about LCLA, they had the opportunity to familiarize a handful of Soldiers who now can take what they've learned back and teach their people prior to the exercise," said Walter L. Murrell, an exercise planner for USARAF and Melbourne, Fla. native.

During the four-day event, 5th QM introduced partnership nation soldiers to the LCLA delivery system. They, along with U.S. Soldiers, were subsequently introduced to the free-drop-delivery system. Read more...

# Soldiers Decorated For Courage Under Fire In Afghanistan

Eleven Fort Hood soldiers receive medals for courage under fire during an ambush in Afghanistan

Two from the 504th Battlefield Surveillance Brigade received Silver Stars.

It's the third highest honor in the military.

"We were ambushed, ordered to fall back, we fall back, and people started getting hurt," said Silver Star recipient SSG Adam Davila.

"At that point, it was how can I get them out of harms way as soon as possible," said Silver Star and Purple Heart Recipient 1LT Steven Hail.

Those moments on April 25, earned Hail the medals.

His unit was moving into a cave near Kandahar when the enemy opened fire.

"I had a couple guys pinned down, and they needed help," said Hail.

Conner Daley had a broken leg, and SGT John Lowery was shot in stomach.

Still both continued to fight, earning themselves Army Commendation Medals.

Hail said, "At that moment, with the men we had on the ground, I knew we needed to move to help SSG Davila and bring SPC Daley back to safe cover."

So he left his covered position, rushing to the aid of Davila, who stayed in harms way to protect Daley.

Hail dragged both to safety.

Davila said, "Had it not been for our excellent training and leadership, it would have been a lot worse," and when asked what got them through, he said, "Just everybody doing their job."

#### 297th BFSB Shoulder Sleeve Insignia



Description: An embroidered insignia 3 inches (7.62 cm) in height and 2 1/2 inches (6.35 cm) in width with a 1/8 inch (.32 cm) Yellow border, a shield blazoned: Per bend Celeste and Argent (Silver Gray) a lightning flash in bend Or between a saber to base point up bendwise of the second and a wolf's head erased Sable eyed with a mullet of the third.

Symbolism: Oriental blue and silver gray, representing loyalty and determination, are associated with Military Intelligence. The yellow/gold border is emblematic of excellence and is the traditional color of Cavalry. The blue and gold are also colors of the Alaska flag where the unit was first organized. The wolf epitomizes the fierce hunter and is symbolic of the brotherhood, bond, and commitment felt within the Brigade. The saber symbolizes the unit's Cavalry scouts. The gold diagonal lightning bolt represents the signal company's part in the Brigade. As a symbol of Alaska, Polaris, the North Star, is shown as the wolf's always true and steady eye, guiding the unit forward with absolute focus and direction. The two sections of the shield refer to the operational and tactical aspects of the unit's primary mission.

Background: The shoulder sleeve insignia was approved effective 1 September 2009. (TIOH Dwg. No. A-1 -987).
