WHY KM IS IMPORTANT TO THE ARMY

Knowledge Management (KM) support the creation, organization, application and transfer of knowledge to facilitate situational understanding and decision making. It is a structured approach to transfer Soldier experiential knowledge in order to give commanders and Soldiers a major tactical advantage on the battlefield.

KM enables effective collaboration by linking the various organizations and Soldiers requiring knowledge. It reduces the fog of war and enhances rapid adaptation in dynamic operations. KM combines analysis and evaluation to create knowledge. Since a broad range of knowledge potentially affects operations, the commander's information requirements may extend beyond purely military matters. Defining these requirements and enabling this knowledge collection, maintenance and transfer are important objectives of effective KM.


